We have been asked to host a state meeting here on the shore. It would certainly be an honor, and if anyone is interested in making a plan, please see Ann.

We were privileged to welcome Jack Helms, a friend of Steve Mallette who is 99 years old. Jack walked up to the front of the meeting and told us a story about his beekeeping years in Florida where he first helped a friend attend over 200 hives and then reduced the number of his own hives to four claiming too many hives, too much work!

Our Guest Speaker, Matt Cormons, took the floor next. Matt has lived in Accomac over 32 years and is a true naturalist. Matt had three areas that he addressed tonight. The first was Roadside Mowing. A topic close to Matt's heart is the present condition of roadside mowing in both counties on the ESVA. Matt elaborated on his quest to limit the destruction of this prime pollinator area, but to no avail. He has researched and written papers sending them to the local and state authorities. He feels he needs more "clout" and wonders if the BGES might add some additional push to limit some of the mowing areas. Several people volunteered to get together and see what they could provide.

Secondly, Matt told us that the time to take honey is any time it is present. He checks regularly on his hives. Strong hives need to be fed all winter long. He knows that in late winter the queen commences laying eggs. He does not feed with pollen. He has had success and has learned from practice over the years. Keeping the hives strong eliminates the shb, wax moths and mites. The bees protect themselves.

Thirdly, Matt makes splits with queen cells, brood, nurse bees and honey. He does this in May and June. He doesn't take honey the first year from a nuc. Again he helps the hive to remain strong. Beekeeping Matt's way is fun and profitable.

After an enjoyable presentation we adjourned for bee-talk and refreshments.

Meeting adjourned at 8:50pm.
