Outreach: Tara Southard reported on the <u>Ducks Unlimited</u> event and said a very successful day was spent at the Nature Conservancy Brownsville grounds. Many children and parents enjoyed the bee table where a demonstration hive captivated kids and adults alike. We sold honey and gave away wildflower seeds for spring planting.

This was their first experience and they documented it beautifully to share with us. The hive netted 5 boxes of "captured" bees. George demonstrated his bee vac. They never saw the queen. They put cone into empty frames and were exhausted after beginning at 10 and completing around 6. George said the next time they may take more hive boxes and it would have been easier if they stood on scaffolding instead of a single ladder. The presentation was so well done, we asked them to show it to the beginner class

Leilani passed around Bee Wrap a wax impregnated linen wrapping paper to use in the refrigerator to cover foods and bowls.

Ann lastly closed the formal part of the meeting. As always the Refreshments were delicious and plentiful and the BGES group enjoyed conversation until after 9 o'clock.
